

Certification process



- Self assessment based on 16 Requirements + R0
- Peer review by two expert and independent reviewers under the responsibility of the CoreTrustSeal Standards and Certification Board
- Successful applications are made publicly available (<u>list of certified</u> repositories)
- Administrative fee of 1,000 euro
- Certification valid 3 years
- CoreTrustSeal Board 2021-2024
- Assembly of Reviewers
- CoreTrustSeal Requirements 2023-2025
- More information on governance: <u>Statutes and Rules of Procedures</u>



Requirements - RO

- Provide background information and context of repository that allow the reviewers to understand your repository and its key characteristics
- Context of the repository: free text option & request to select either 'specialist' or 'generalist'. Specialist repositories are asked to clarify their specialist scope.
- Describe clearly:
 - Designated Community
 - Levels of curation



Requirements - Organisational Infrastructure

- Mission & Scope (R01)
- Rights Management (R02)
- Continuity of Service (R03)
- Legal & Ethical (R04)
- Governance & Resources (R05)
- Expertise & Guidance (R06)



Requirements - Digital Object Management

- Provenance and authenticity (R07)
- Deposit & Appraisal (R08)
- Preservation plan (R09)
- Quality Assurance (R10)
- Workflows (R11)
- Discovery and Identification (R12)
 - Reuse (R13)

Requirements - Information Technology & Security

- Storage & Integrity (R14)
- Technical Infrastructure (R15)
- Security (R16)



Compliance level

The applicant must indicate a compliance level for each of the Requirements:

- In Progress: the repository is in the implementation phase.
- Implemented: the requirement has been fully implemented by the repository.
- The reviewer will assess compliance level against:
 - Response statement
 - Supporting evidence
- Reviewer may propose a lower Compliance Level than selected by the applicant. In that case, they should explain the reason.



Practical

- Focus on describing your practices
- CLARIN-wide common supporting evidence benefits all
 - Be clear on how you comply with e.g. CLARIN common practices or requirements
- Continuity plan is important
- Peer-to-peer discussions before submitting have proven helpful

Start with a triage

Is the definition of the Designated Community clear enough?

Do you offer active preservation?

0

Check R0 to ensure that you have described the scope, knowledge base, and methodologies of the group(s) of users at whom the curation and preservation measures are primarily targeted.

Check Preservation Plan (R09) and ensure that you have described your preservation actions.

Check Deposit & Appraisal (R08) and that you have described what kind of preservation actions your digital objects receive.

Are the outcomes of the curation aligned with the needs of the Designated Community?

Check Reuse (R13) that you have included information on how appropriate information is available to support understanding and use of digital objects over time.



CoreTrustSeal Levels of Curation 2019-2025

Level	Description
A.	Content distributed as deposited.
В.	Basic curation – e.g. brief checking, addition of basic metadata or documentation
C.	Enhanced curation – e.g. conversion to new formats during ingest, enhancement of documentation and metadata
D.	Data-level curation – as in C above, but with additional editing of deposited data

From CoreTrustSeal Guidance

2019-2021, 2020-2022

- Curation understood as "adding value by enhancing content"
- Initial deposits unchanged, edits only on copies

2023-2025

- Curation as prerequisite for "assuring long-term accessibility and understandability of data as the needs of the Designated Community change"
- Initial deposits unchanged, edits only on copies
- Sufficient metadata for independent use by Designated Community
- Measures for active preservation in place



Re-certification?


- For re-certification, check feedback received in the previous application
 - Address earlier comments
 - Describe how you have fulfilled the promises of improvement
- When CoreTrustSeal certification is renewed, The expectation is to see a move from 'in progress' to 'implemented' or clear explanations as to why this is not possible.
